"VOICE OF PAUL-x-LUKE" SERIES

This series shows how the writings of the apostle Paul and his traveling-&-writing assistant Luke, all tie in together to construct "the basic frame of the entire New Testament" from 16 of its books. Under Paul's unique influence, all these writings emphasize God forging His People into a new kind of Followership whose "growth policy" involves embodying every kind of people & heritage. It is within the framework of this people-building endeavor that (1) the Forgiving-&-Restoring Power of Jesus especially gets to be displayed, and where (2) its best participants are those whose lives have God's Presence "pouring forth" within them.

study #34: Does Paul Write Hebrews ("Cosmic Brothers", cont.) to Priests in Antioch? — covering Hebrews 7-13 —

ACTION #1. The very 1st-half of Hebrews shows its readers how the legacies of both ¹Moses and ²Joshua were always meant to be massive examples of the even-better characteristics of the coming Messiah, Jesus. The 2nd-half of Hebrews doubles down on that theme, describing the legacy of "the original Hebrew/Jew" ³Abraham, plus his descendants' tribal ⁴Priesthood, and even the original ⁵Temple-&-Sacrifices system: these, too, were all meant to point out the even-better characteristics of the coming Messiah, Jesus. As a group, discuss:

- what do folks in your group know about any of the 5 Hebrew/Jewish names or themes in blue above?
- why might it be smart or important to connect those Jewish themes with "how the Messiah works"?

ACTION #2. Read Hebrews 10:19-25 & 32-29 and then discuss:

- re-describe in your own words what each of these 2 batches of verses is saying
- what does it sound like the readers of this book have already been through and experienced in the past?
- would you say the author's spirit sounds more "sympathetic," or "hurry-up-&-get-back-up-&-go-again"?

ACTION #3. One of people's most favorite sections in the entire Bible is **Hebrews chapter 11**—a long list of Hebrew ⁶**World-Changers** who were really just living bravely for God. Browse through it—each on your own for just a minute—then read **Hebrews 12:1-11** all together and discuss:

- how is the author using the list of World-Changers in chapter 11 to exhort readers to "step it up"?
- in your own words, what all is the author saying here in his teaching about God's "discipline"?
- (from browsing chapter 11 briefly, which verse or person in it connects with you the most?)

ACTION #4. The author wants to show readers that Jesus' Messiahship has a more excellent Hebrew DNA than each of the 6 massive Hebrew themes above. (Basically, a bold and daring relationship with Jesus literally brings us everything we should ever need or want). Read **Hebrews 12:18-24** & **13:10-14** and then discuss:

- in Hebrews 12:18-24, what exactly have those following Christ successfully "come to"?
- in Hebrews 13:10-14, how was Jesus an "outsider" and why is it good to know this?

EXTRA... FOR THOSE MOTIVATED, DEVOTED, & WITH SOME SELF-COMMAND:

GOLD CHALLENGE ... read ahead (& maybe journal about) for next study: Philippians
PENGUIN CHALLENGE ... (=daily reading + cover full NT+Psalms during series): read GC plus Revelation 15-18

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
